General Rules

- In order for club members to participate in the Dairy Show, an Animal Identification form for each club is required. All Dairy Animal Exhibitors must present a premise ID number and have an identification for their animal. Identification includes an ear tag, RFID, registration papers, or tattoo. Return your completed forms to the Department Chair or Barn Superintendent along with all other required documents. Please see page 141 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms.
- 2. All animals must be checked in with superintendent **before** they are stalled.
- 3. All livestock must be owned or under managerial agreement between the owner and exhibitor. Animals must be shown by the person who made the entry. In the case of an emergency, contact the superintendent for permission to have a substitute leadsperson. Substitute leads persons should be a member of a recognized St. Croix County youth group.
- 4. Exhibitors who preregistered in the wrong class or failed to preregister will be allowed to show for a ribbon only (no premiums and ineligible for champions). This includes showmanship. If the exhibitor believes the entry was made correctly, please check at the fair office.
- 5. Limit of four (4) beef or dairy or combination not to exceed four (4) animals total.
- 6. The St. Croix County 4-H Dairy Committee has established the following judging schedule for dairy breeds other than Holsteins. The sequence of breeds for the colored show will be as follows: Alphabetical Order followed by Any Other Breed. The show order will be as follows: Registered Jr. calf, Grade Jr. calf classes and so forth through the lot numbers for Junior cattle of the breed. At the end of the senior yearling classes, the Junior Champions of each class may be selected at the discretion of the judge.
- 7. The Senior cattle show will begin after a 30-minute break following the conclusion of the heifer show and morning showmanship classes. The sequence of breeds for the colored show will be in alphabetical order followed by Any Other Breed. The show order will begin with the lowest lot number and proceed through the highest lot number for each class. At the end of the senior show for a class, a Senior Champion, registered and grade, may be selected at the discretion of the judge.
- 8. If large errors concerning space are found in dairy entries as compared to animal counts sent in for barn stalling, a club may not be eligible for Herdsmanship awards. Loss of future space may also occur. Action will be taken by the Dairy Committee.
- 9. It is strongly recommended by the St. Croix County 4-H Dairy Committee that 3rd Grade Members show a calf born on December 1 or after of that fair year. 3rd Grade Members may show in the regular class at the discretion of their parents. 3rd Grade Members entering the dairy cattle show are encouraged to select from Classes A-E, Lots 1-4. 3rd Grade Members showmanship classes will be judged at 11:00 am in the colored breed ring. 3rd Grade Members must be registered in the dairy project on their 4-H enrollment forms to be eligible.
- 10. Registered and Grade Jr Champions may be chosen in all breeds at the discretion of the judge. Junior and Senior Champion and Reserve Champion: The top 2 blues in each heifer or cow class are eligible for Junior Champion and Senior Champion, respectively.

Breed Champion: The Junior and Senior champions of a breed will compete for the Breed Champion

Supreme Champion: The Breed Champions will compete for the Supreme Champion

Age Classifications

SPRING CALF is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

WINTER CALF is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

FALL CALF is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year. **SUMMER YEARLING** is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year. **SPRING YEARLING** is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

WINTER YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

FALL YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year

Jr 2 YEAR-OLD is one born between March 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A Jr 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

Sr 2 YEAR-OLD is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

3 YEAR-OLD is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

4 YEAR-OLD is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

Cows 5 YEARS AND OLDER is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the sixth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year.

DRY COW 3 YEARS AND OLDER date of birth is after August 31st of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

If the project member doesn't abide by the rule the animal is subject to disqualification and will be ineligible for auction or show per discretion of the St Croix County Meat Animal Committee and/or Breeding Stock Committee.
- 6. All beef must be checked in before stalling.
- 7. Barn Stalling will be assigned prior to the fair and a representative from each club exhibiting in the beef area is required to attend the stalling night held at the fairgrounds prior to the fair.
- 8. Market Beef show will be Friday at 8AM.
- 9. Bred & Owned Market Animals or Breeding Stock beef needs to have the Dam of the offspring owned and bred by the exhibitor and/or family.

Market/Breeding Stock

- 1. After the Market Beef are weighed in at final weigh ins, the fair officials will determine the classes.
- 2. All steers must be polled or de-horned.
- 3. No drugs can be used in animals at the fair.
- 4. Market classes will include the beef breeds, crossbred beef, market heifers, dairy/beef cross, and dairy steers.
- 5. Market animals will be weighed in from 12:30pm to 2pm on Thursday of the fair. All beef are eligible to show and MUST have a SCMA ear tag upon arrival to the fairgrounds. After weigh-ins the beef will be divided into appropriate classes based on weight into evenly distributed classes determined by the St. Croix County Meat Animal Committee. The top 2 blues from each lot number within a class will compete for champion of that weight class.
- 6. If an exhibitor is showing 2 beef and both market beef fall into the same weight class, one beef must move to the heavier weight class. If both beef fall into the heaviest weight class the exhibitor will only be allowed to take premiums on one exhibit.
- Market Animal show will be a 'No Fit Show'. Exhibitors are allowed to clip, wash, comb, blow, and use of hair conditioners. Exhibitors are not allowed to use adhesives, glues, powder, paints, artificial color and hair. Breeding Stock may be fitted ONLY by exhibitor, parent or guardian, brother or sister or other Jr. beef exhibitors.

- 6. All sheep must be checked in at the designated registration area prior to penning on Thursday of the fair. No exceptions. Exhibitors MUST present all scrapie's identification and flock tags at the designated registration area prior to penning. Please, refer to rules and guidelines for check-in information
- 7. If only one exhibitor is competing in any class, the judge may recommend any placing of his/her discretion. Judges will not place unworthy entries. Classes may be combined per DATCP rules and guidelines.
- 8. Sheep show times will be provided in the 4-H Communicator and posted at the Fair. Times are subject to change.
- 9. Proper attire is **strongly recommended**. That includes appropriate footwear for species, good polo or buttondown shirt, skirt at or below the knee and a pair of jeans/slacks (long pants) in good repair.
- 10. Sheep can be shown by any youth member, dressed appropriately, if the exhibitor already has one animal in the ring.
- 11. All tack and fitting stands need to be cleaned up after the show and presentable to the public.

Market Sheep

- 1. Limit of 2 market animals per exhibitor. (Wether or Ewe of any breed)
- 2. All animals must have an official scrapie tag or other form of scrapie identification (tattoo) as outlined in the Animal Health Rules & Regulations Summary page earlier in this Fairbook.
- 3. Market Sheep will be weighed in on Thursday Morning of the fair. All eligible animals MUST have a SCLC ear tag upon arrival to the fairgrounds. After weigh-ins the sheep will be divided into the appropriate number of classes according to weights determined by the St. Croix County Meat Animal Committee.. If both animals fall into the same weight class, the exhibitor may have another enrolled project member show one of the animals.
- 4. To be eligible for the auction, minimum weight of 100 lbs. and no maximum must be met.
- 5. All Market lambs must be slick shorn prior to weigh-in and show. Slick shorn is defined as wool no longer than 1/4".
- 6. A pen of lambs is 2 market lambs only.
- 7. Exhibitors may not use another exhibitor's animals to compete in a pen.
- 8. Bred & Owned Market Lambs need to have the dam of the offspring owned & bred by the exhibitor and/or family.

- 9. A market sheep can be a wether or ewe. If an ewe is shown it is excluded from Breeding Stock classes.
- 10. Market Sheep may only be shown in designated market class, pen of finished lambs, and showmanship class.
- 11. Market animal exhibitors need to refer to the livestock rules for further detail not included in the fairbook.

Breeding Stock Sheep

- 1. All registered breeding stock animals must be registered through a recognized breed association.
- 2. All sheep must have scrapie tags
- 3. Wether Style is any unregistered or crossbred sheep, with a "market lamb" look. (ex: natural colored)
- 4. Commercial style is a production-oriented sheep. (ex: speckled face)
- 5. Any Other Breed is reserved for breeds not listed as a class.
- 6. All breeds should be shown according to breed standards.

- 8. A pen of includes a spring, winter of fall ram lamb or a spring winter or fall ewe lamb of the same breed and same sex shown in appropriate classes by the same exhibitor.
- 9. A flock consists of 3 animals including a ram (yearling or lamb) and a combination of 2 ewes (lamb, yearling, or mature) shown in appropriate classes by the same exhibitor.
- 10. Exhibitors may not use another exhibitor's animals to compete in a pair, pen, or flock.
- 11. Breeding stock sheep shall have NO MARKET TAGS.
- 12. Breeding stock exhibitors need to refer to the Livestock Rules for further details not included in the fairbook.
- 13. Bred and owned breeding stock lambs need to have the dam of the offspring owned and bred by the exhibitor and/or family.*

- An Animal Identification form for each club is required. All Animal Exhibitors must present a premise ID number and have an identification for their animal. Identification includes an ear tag, RFID, registration papers, or tattoo. Return your completed form to the Department Chair or Barn Superintendent along with all other required documents. Please see page 141 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms.
- 2. In order to participate in the Showmanship Class and Carcass Evaluation Class the exhibitor needs to sign up on Fair Entry or the current online fair signup site.
- 3. Limit of 8 animals per exhibitor.
- 4. **3**rd **Graders** may exhibit one animal in the Showmanship Class and/or appropriate breeding stock class. The exhibitor must be able to control the animal. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to follow all DATCP and St. Croix County Livestock Committee rules, clinic and health requirements for the department.

- 7. Any questions please contact a committee member as soon as possible.
- 8. If only one exhibitor is competing in any class, the judge may recommend any placing at his or her discretion. Judges will not place unworthy entries.
- 9. Bracing of goats is <u>allowed</u> with the understanding that the goat is not lifted or prompted to have the front feet leave the ground.

General Rules

- Hunter Over Fences, Dressage, and Gymkhana are governed by the St. Croix County 4-H Horse Project. You must be a member, in good standing, of the St. Croix County Horse Project to participate in these events.
- Pleasure and Trail are governed under Fair Board Rules and anyone can participate.
- Current 4-H participants only are eligible State Competition (Contact show committee for details).
- 4-H participants only, grades 6-13, are eligible for the State Hunt/Dressage Show which is held in June (prior to the county fair show). Contact show committee for eligibility requirements.
- Participants are encouraged to attend at least one clinic specific to each discipline with the horse they are planning on showing at the fair.
- Riding bareback or riding double is not allowed at any time, riders must be astride the horse properly at all times.
- The Show Committee reserves the right to split or combine classes depending on class size
- Participants may drop entries on the day of the show.

PLEASURE SHOW

- St. Croix County Pleasure Horse Show will be held on Sunday at 8:00 am
- In **Pleasure** classes, the horse and rider are judged on manners and suitability of the horse for a relaxed but collected gait, relatively slow speed, along with calm and responsive disposition.
- **Equitation** refers to a rider's position while mounted and encompasses a rider's ability to ride correctly and with effective aids. In competition, the rider, rather than the horse is evaluated.
- Stock Seat/Western classes require a Western saddle and a shanked bit, unless the horse is 5 years old or younger. The rider uses one hand on the reins with a shanked bit. Horses 5 years old and younger may be shown in a snaffle bit. 2 hands on the reins are allowed if the horse is ridden in a snaffle bit. Riders are required to wear a long sleeved, collared shirt, boots and helmet. (Illegal bits include but not limited to: Cow horse, gag bits, bits without shanks, any bit where the bit slides)
- **English classes** require English saddle and bridle. Riders are required to wear breeches, jacket, tall boots or paddock boots with half chaps and helmet.
- **Pony** is defined as height, measured at the withers of 56 inches or less. If you ride a pony by this definition, you ride in the pony Lots. In other classes, the horses and ponies are judged together.
- **Draft** exhibitors will need an adult in the cart with them when driving. Both need to wear a helmet.
- **Trail** See the kick-off materials for the date/time when the St. Croix County Trail Class Judging will be held. Trail can be ridden Western or English, but you need to wear attire that matches the discipline you are riding. Example: if you are riding English you need to be in English attire.
- Riding bareback or riding double is not allowed at any time, riders must be astride the horse properly at all times..

HUNTER HACK:

- Check-in will be available from 10am to 6pm on fair entry day at the poultry building for a health check and submit the Pullorum-Typhoid free documentation prior to caging any bird on the premises. Return your completed form to the Department Chair or Barn Superintendent along with all other required documents. Please see page 141 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms.
- 2. All poultry (including waterfowl) must demonstrate one of the following:
 - a. Originate from flocks designated as US Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate. Request an originating flock pullorum free certification document when purchasing chicks.
 - b. Originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by the corresponding enrollment certificate for the current year.
 - c. Be accompanied by documentation from a Wisconsin Certified Tester indicating each individual mature bird, identified with a band or tag, has been tested and found negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma Gallisepticum for turkeys) within the last 90 days.
- Turkeys now require a blood draw sent to the Barron or other qualified lab to be tested for both Pullorum and M. Gallisepticum. The draw should be done by a Wisconsin Certified Tester. There is a lab charge and results take about 2 weeks.
- 4. Immature birds cannot be tested and must originate from a tested flock. All testing and documentation must be completed before entry day. If you have questions or need testing contact Bonnie Walters at 715-772-334 or bonnie.s.walters@uwrf.edu.
- 5. Any bird appearing unhealthy or having parasites (mites, fecal worms, etc) or without correct Pullorum paperwork will be refused entry. Any birds exhibiting signs of ill health during the fair will be removed and disqualified.
- 6. All entries must be made in the name of the actual owner or owner's immediate family and exhibits must be raised by the exhibitor.
- 7. Exhibitors are allowed only one entry per lot.
- 8. Exhibitors are allowed to exhibit no more than 15 total poultry entries. A market chicken entry is 2 birds (see lot description).
- 9. 3rd Grade Members are allowed to enter their bird in a regular class as well as showmanship.
- 10. Judging will begin at 9am on Saturday. Ribbons will be awarded according to the Danish system. No premiums will be paid on disqualified exhibits.
- 11. Exhibitors responsibilities:
 - a. The fair will exercise all reasonable vigilance in the care of the exhibits and police arrangements of the building, but all specimens must be entered at the owner's risk.

All exhibitors will be notified of the barn duty schedule prior to the fair. Check the 4-H website in the poultry section or with the contacts listed above if you do not receive notification.

- Advanced Standard Agility This class may include single, double, and triple bar jumps, tire jump, wing jumps, broad jump, panel jump, and twelve weave poles, open tunnels, a pause table, A-frame (maximum height 4' 6"), dog walk and seesaw. There will be a maximum of 20 obstacles and course time will be 75 seconds.
